We will be playing over 100 films in 20 thematic blocks, holding talks/workshops and conducting Q&As with the filmmakers in attendance. There should be something for everyone and we hope you all enjoy our 2023 line-up!

About The Festival

Oxford Shorts (formerly known before this year as the Oxford International Short Film Festival or OXISFF) celebrates the diversity and creativity of short films. We believe shorts films are an art form in themselves, ideally one which should be experienced together. We look for great stories with strong characters, unique voices, or evocative worlds that are designed to stir emotions.

Our inaugural festival ran on Saturday 23rd March 2019 at St John's College, Oxford. Tickets to the event sold out extremely quickly. The day attracted over 200 audience members across three onsite venues, with over 90 films being played. Our line-up included the 2019 BAFTA-award winning animation Roughhouse by Jonathan Hodgson and a special interview with Academy Award-winning visual effects supervisor Paul J. Franklin (Oscar wins for Inception and Interstellar).

The pandemic forced the festival online for 2020. We played 135 entries over eleven weeks from 8 May to 23 July. Every week, we held live Q&A chats with filmmakers, and ran a number of talks and masterclasses with our friends and sponsors at the SAE Institute and The Film Festival Doctor.

For 2021, we build upon both of these very different festival experiences by hosting both online and in-person screenings whilst still having to maintain social distancing.

This year we return back with over 100 short film entries, talks and workshops – playing both live and online.


